

Here are some ways to make the experience more exciting for both of you:

- ★ Write down the question or comment as well as the context. What caused him or her to ask the question? What were you both doing at the time?
- ★ Write down the answer and the ways you sought the answer together. Did you visit the library? Did you do something extraordinary to expand the answer, such as visiting a local museum or zoo, making a drawing, building a model, or experimenting?
- ★ What was the result of your experience? Did it lead to more questions? What did you discover that you didn't know? And most important, did you both have fun?

Suppose you notice your child sitting with elbow on knee and chin on hand, appearing to be deep in thought.

“You look just like ‘The Thinker!’” you say. Chances are your child will ask what it is. After you explain it's a sculpture, your child asks, “Where is ‘The Thinker’?”


A Simple Question Leads to a Memorable Day of Fun.


